

## **Flooding Report**

## **Flooding in Marton**

At a recent Cemex liaison meeting with local parish councils, the issue of flooding in the village was raised. One of the WCC councillors present has responsibility for Community Safety in his portfolio and promised to look into current policy on manging flooding on the A423 in Marton. This is the response he received from WCC officers. The parish council thought it would be useful to share this feedback with the village.



"The village is closely bordered on three sides by the River Leam, the River Itchen, and an unnamed watercourse. As such, much of the issues in the village relate to flooding from these watercourses, or water not being able to drain away as the levels of the watercourses are up.



Fortunately, much of the flooding is confined to the highway, and we do not hold any contemporary reports of internal property flooding. Anecdotally, we understand that vehicles driving through the flood water causes bow waves that may have flooded properties, but when we have followed up such reports, we have not been able to confirm internal property flooding.

To try to help reduce the impact of bow waves caused by driving through the water the village has always been keen to be able to put out signage and to close the road. This



was investigated by the team and the emergency planning team (CSWR) some years ago and found not to be possible. At the time, this was communicated to MPC, but possibly not clearly enough.

My understanding of road closures is that only the police or the local highway authority have the power to close roads. The police can close a road "on the spot" due to safety concerns and will usually request that county highways put up appropriate traffic management. The local highway authority however, have to follow a process to do so and timescales do not lend themselves to an emergency response.

Beyond having the appropriate powers to close a road, there are issues around villages closing off roads without appropriate diversions in place, and importantly informing relevant parties – for example, we wouldn't want an ambulance not being able to get to

it's destination due to a series of local-led road closures.

In terms of the wider flooding issues, the Environmental Agency (EA) undertook a feasibility study into possible Flood Defences at Marton in 2001. This report found that whilst a technically viable solution is possible, the benefit cost ratio for it was below 0.5 so could not be progressed. As such, the EA have indicated that this is not something they will revisit.

In response to this, the parish council commissioned their own study in 2016 with JBA and again the conclusion was that there are limited options to prevent the flooding, and focus should be on alerts, warnings and preparation. Part of this was to develop a local flood action plan with our resilience team."



- 6.2 **Community Speedwatch** another member has been trained to use the equipment. More volunteers would be helpful to facilitate more sessions which are likely to be affected by weather/light considerations over the winter.

Bad weather will reduce the number of sessions that can be undertaken over the winter period.

New sign frames have been purchased using £103 of the remaining budget.

#### 7. PLANNING MATTERS

7.1 R23/0245 at 11, GREENACRES, BIRDINGBURY ROAD, MARTON, RUGBY, CV23 9RY

A unanimous opposing vote to this application was passed on the grounds of: CONDITION 4 of the original planning stated: The granny annex hereby permitted shall not be occupied at any time other than for purposes ancillary to the residential use of the dwelling known as Greenacres, 11 Birdingbury Road, Marton, CV23 9RY and shall only be occupied by members of the family occupying Greenacres, 11 Birdingbury Road and shall not be used as a separate dwelling. REASON: In the interest of residential amenity.

Also concern regarding precedent set for irregular infilling along Birdingbury Road.

#### 8. VILLAGE ISSUES

- 8.1 **Storage**. Now complete. Most of the racking has been acquired. MPC equipment has been moved over to the storage space. MPC will cover the costs of getting keys cut for Cllrs and the Clerk.
- 8.2 **Flooding**. Cllr Fry reported that the issue of HGVs passing through the village at a time of flooding was raised at the Cemex liaison meeting. Problem with ingress of water into properties from bow waves needed to be pointed out to their drivers. The transport manager's phone number was shared so he could be informed when flooding occurs to warn drivers.

WCC councillor Andy Crump was also at the liaison meeting and as the 'Portfolio Holder for Fire & Rescue and Community Safety' he offered to investigate the issue of road closures. The response he received, which he then passed onto MPC, stated that it was not possible to change arrangements from the current situation that often resulted in tardy responses from police and WCC Highways. It was agreed to share the WCC report with the village via the December Newsletter.

Hedges by the bridge are planned to be cut to clear the footpath.

North St flooding – the drains were jetted earlier in the summer.

Footpath from main road into the Orchard – emailed the department who dealt with the new footpath by the garages in the Orchard and raised as an issue.

Request for old sign to be removed in the Orchard.

Pothole on High St has been raised. DF requested photo. DF to action.

9.5a **Dog Bins.** DF to get installation moving with RBC

9.5b Continuation of pavement on main road

**to Long Itchington**. Requested RBC Cllr Dale Keeling looks into this.

9.5c Upgrading the R213 footpath to a bridleway. Sustrans were invited to attend tonight's meeting to discuss their responsibilities for managing access and signage to their planned upgrading of the Lias Line. This may or may not include consideration of the footpath's status and whether they plan to start the lengthy process of applying for a bridleway status change (to allow bike use).

The parish council is concerned about what Sustrans' plans are for access to the Lias Line, given the only local official entry points are Birdingbury Road and Long Itchington, but the wider public may see Marton as a place of access (potentially also parking if transporting bikes by car). Access for people living in Marton also needs due consideration.

MPC will continue to try to set a date when Sustrans can come and discuss plans in more detail and hear residents' views. Residents requested to continue to monitor and communicate any issues with MPC.

- 9.6 Marton Practical Ecology Group (MPEG). No updates. Aiming to cut the wildflower areas again before winter.
- 9.7 **Streetlights**. No update. Clerk proposes to raise a formal complaint with WCC.

9.8 Rugby Area Meeting feedback. Cllr Fry attended the reformed Warwickshire Association for Local Councils Rugby Area Group who met at the Rugby Council Chamber for their one face to face meeting each year (the other three by Zoom). All the principal RBC heads of department were in attendance to give brief reports It proved an invaluable meeting with other parish councils who raised many shared issues especially in respect of service regarding planning applications. Due to financial cutbacks, this was the first such meeting with any of the principal councils for at least four years and they have been much missed as an invaluable means for parish councillors to operate effectively.

9.10 Liaison Meeting with Cemex. They have submitted a planning application for developing an Addmixture site in Southam which will create 11 extra lorry movements through the village each day.

Asking for applications for their community fund.

9.11 Severn Trent and sewage disposal in the village. Cllr Fry shared his frustration at the lack of communication over various village issues with Severn Trent e.g. concerns with potential blockages in their pipes. Noise from drainage covers. Support on flood prevention issues. Despite regular phone calls and promises of call-backs no contact has been

# Did you know? - Marton's Migrants

- That one of our most common garden birds, blackbirds are actually partially migratory within the UK (Scottish populations visit Northern Ireland, for example) and are strongly migratory from and within Europe, with birds from Scandinavia and the Baltics joining our very own UK residents in winter.





- That one rather exotic looking bird to look out for this month is the Waxwing. These beautiful reddish-brown birds are not much bigger than a Starling, but their punkrocker crest makes them a "stand out". They're named for the red tips on their wings, looking as if they've been dipped in sealing wax.

Waxwings are more usually found in Scandinavia and Northern Russia, but small numbers visit the UK including occasionally, MARTON in winter, with flocks crossing the North Sea in a quest for their favourite food: berries. You'll sometimes spot individual birds or small flocks in Rowan trees or Hawthorn bushes. I've seen them before on Paul and Ann's Rowan opposite Marton Manor House.

Quite a few Waxwings have already been spotted this autumn, so fingers crossed... we might yet see them in Marton.

# Marton Local History Group 'Warwick Metal Detecting Club - Detecting the Past'

## 7.30 Monday 29 January 2024 Marton Village Hall



It has been quite a few years since we have had the county archaeologists talk to our group, but this time we have invited another organisation

dedicated to practical history. The Warwick Metal Detecting Club tread very carefully through the ethical minefield of metal detecting and have a well deserved reputation amongst landowners and the county museum for care taken in their work. They have detected in the area for a number of years, especially over the river at Hockley Farm. More recently they have carried out surveys in areas of Marton. Hear about their work and their finds in January and perhaps invite them to inspect your property!

## Tales from the Graveyard - October Meeting

Following on from last year's 'Tales from the Graveyard' members of the MLHG revealed further insights about some of those buried in St Esprit's graveyard.

Joan Cashmore's parents - the Kennings family history - was revealed in-depth from their nineteenth century origins in the area through to their move to Church Street, where Joan continued to live until recently. It was appropriate that this research had been done by Lisa, who bought the house from Joan's decedents.



Another grave has an intriguing headstone dedicated to the wife of a London based Victorian artist.

Elizabeth Harley was



married to George Harley. She died in 1905 having lived for the last few years of her life in the village with her sister, Harriet Twigger,

at Marton Manor House. The sisters had both originally came from Shropshire but had ended up marrying wealthy London based professionals. It was speculated how they could have met their husbands, but it is likely to remain a mystery.

Most revealing of all was a presentation on the gravestone of a Marton child, Nicola, who had died in the 1960s.



The revelation was not about Nicola's life but the gravestone itself. If it was not for the personal recollection of Joan Sherratt we would never have understood its significance. The small stone was carved with angels by Barbara Newsome, who lived in Marton House. She began the annual Marton Art Exhibition in the 1960s and created the sun sculptures seen on walls around the village. Look out for the stone by the east end of the church. It is rather weathered now and its features a little unclear.



# Back Tracks: Detecting the Past - November Meeting

Two amateur historians, Colin and Phil, spoke in November about their fascination with interpreting old maps and aerial photographs. They were especially interested in modern LiDAR views that are made up of millions of laser data points taken from aircraft.

Many examples from all over Warwickshire were used to give insights that can be derived from these photos and maps. Roman roads that are no longer obviously discernible on the ground can be picked up on the photos and then supported with further clues from large scale Ordnance Survey maps. A few potential examples were suggested for the Marton area (apart froe the Fosse Way), and indeed some that passed right through the village.

A rather more complex theory relating to a type of Roman land measurement (an 'actus') was described. Examples were given showing how Roman roads, settlement layouts and fields from Roman times can still be found in the area today.



## **Local History Group**

The one disappointment was the lack of an analysis of the Marton LiDAR view that had been circulated before the meeting (see left); a complaint that was accepted by the speakers. Subsequent email discussion in the days since has helped to remedy the situation and members of the MLHG email group have had the findings passed onto them.

Some of the Marton features identified are existing patches of pre-enclosure ridge and furrow, and even older field boundaries that pre-date the Saxon three field system. The stronger and weaker candidates for Roman routeways have also been identified. Finally, the Saxon origins of the name Marton, meaning 'farm by the pool' has led to a search for the pool. There is good evidence that it stretched from the playing fields south to beyond the railway lines, where low -lying, boggy land has led to much drainage work over the centuries.

# Christmas promise and the promise of a new year.

Christmas promises a lot. Looking forward to the season, our imaginations paint a vivid and inviting picture for us. A powerful cocktail made up of nostalgia and advertisements conjures up a captivating scene, where loved ones gather, fires glow brightly, tables creak under their load of food and drink, lights twinkle, and the sounds are of laughter and merriment. It is a blissful scene where grievances, bank balances and family problems are forgotten, and from which all worry and unforgiveness have been banished. The image is often summed up in the phrase "The Christmas spirit."

I hope we will all enjoy at least some of such scenes this year. And yet, in truth, the season itself rarely delivers what it promises: someone is sick, an unexpected bill arrives amidst the Christmas cards, the internet is

down or maybe a relative is upset about something. And then in the aftermath of Christmas "ho-ho!" turns to "ho-hum". Relatives go home, decorations come down, presents get returned, diets begin, and the music stops. Some slide from celebration to desperation. "Oh no, another year has passed." We move from revelry to routine. Such a scenario could be depressing, but it need not be so. There is a Christmas spirit with a lasting effect, but there are three conditions to keeping it:

Firstly, we need to remember that Christmas is about giving. Dig beneath the tinsel of tradition, listen beyond the noise and babble of the season, and you will discover that Christmas is about God's gift to us.

He gave Himself to us in Jesus, the baby whose birth we celebrate, that we might be forgiven and brought back to Him. Christmas, ultimately, is about God's gift to us. One of the best known and loved Bible verses, John 3:16, reminds us that "God so loved the World that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life." Yet to receive God's giving comes with responsibility: to take it in, we must also give it out. Christmas is a time for open hearts, open houses, and open wallets. It is a season when we put others first. Jesus Himself reminds us that it is more blessed to give than to receive. (Acts 20:35.) The rejected opportunity to give is a lost opportunity to receive. In his depiction of the miser Ebenezer

Scrooge in "A Christmas Carol" Charles Dickens managed to show someone who, through a better understanding of Christmas, came to find giving to be far more rewarding than taking. You can give without loving, but you cannot love without giving.

Secondly, Christmas is about forgiving. One of the most celebrated stories of the First World War is of the tragically short-lived truce that broke out on 25 December, 1914. Because of the coming of Jesus, Christmas is all about God delivering us from all we have done wrong. Christmas is God's offer of a lasting peace to us all. If we are to accept God's gift, we must understand that it is a peace that comes with obligations. To understand what it is to be truly forgiven is to practise forgiveness towards others. Nothing destroys the Christmas spirit more than the bitter flavour of unforgiven grudges and hurts. This Christmas don't just give 21

#### but forgive.

Thirdly, Christmas is about living. To seek the festivities of Christmas and miss the message is to keep the wrapping and to throw away the gift! Christmas is about life. Jesus said: "I have come that they might have life and have it to the full." (John 10:10.) To understand Christmas and all that it really means is to receive God's gift of a joy that lasts, not just for a few days, but forever. To keep the true Christmas spirit, we need to find the one who gives it. This season, give, forgive and live!
