Our Lovely New Road



The start of summer brought a surprise announcement from Warwickshire Highways that they were to resurface the road south of the village. Although welcome it brought a few comments about there being worse roads that needed resurfacing and the costs involved. We put these points to Warwickshire Highways.

Regarding costs there was no information "as this would be commercially sensitive data"

Criteria for Resurfacing

A more comprehensive response concerning criteria for resurfacing was forthcoming:

"the condition of Warwickshire's road network is established through a regime of both visual and machine-based surveys undertaken across the whole of the carriageway and footway network over a rolling two-year cycle. These surveys follow nationally designed criteria to produce comparable condition data for each length

of the network.

"We examine the survey data using specialist software and apply a process known as 'Deterioration Modelling' to predict the relative condition of the highway network over the coming years and this helps us to decide where we should be channelling resources at the optimum time to treat our roads in the most cost-effective way, providing the greatest benefit.

"We take account of a range of factors other than road condition in our decision making, such as road usage levels, defect history, proximity to local amenities like schools & colleges and environmental issues such as noise pollution. Once all the factors have been taken into consideration a candidate list is produced of the maintenance schemes where the greatest benefit can be achieved."

Anti-skid Surface

Some residents were concerned that the hard fought for safety surfacing along

the southern gateway to the village did not seem to be replaced, including the



warning red tarmac.

A later response from Highways clarified the situation:

"regarding the red coloured surfacing, we wouldn't reinstate this immediately anyway as we need the traffic to wear the binder down to ensure good adhesion, usually we reinstate this 4-6 weeks after surfacing"

What we call the anti-skid

surface and they call high friction surfacing (HFS), they no longer replace due to it being a maintenance burden. However, they have increased the PSV (polished stone value) to 68 rather than the basic 60 in lieu of the HFS. According to Google 68psv "indicates a high level of skid resistance"



There is no doubt that parts of the road leading into the village needed work as evidenced by the photograph on the left. There have also been ponding issues caused partly by the road camber that they were aware of. Hopefully these issues will have been addressed by all the work done.

Even if only from an aesthetic point of view the work has been a success, though the skid marks at the village entrance are already beginning to obscure the white lines and the necessity for the extra grippy tarmac.

Finally, is it just me or do cars make less noise on the new tarmac?

A Restored Bus Shelter

Thanks to the skillful intervention of a village handyman, who wishes to remain anonymous, a long neglected part of the village has been given a new lease of life.



The timber shelter has long been under attack from the elements and the surrounding

vegetation. It has been many years since it has been painted, and then by creosote, which gives an idea of the length of time as its use was banned in 2003. The new finish was applied with Cuprinol 'Seasoned Oak'. Hopefully this will give another few decades of life (though the interior still needs some work).

Of necessity the surrounding vegetation needed to be cut back to allow a special sealant to be applied to the roof. The opportunity was taken to also tackle the growth of brambles through the trees that, of late, had begun to be an obstacle on the footpath. In doing so some of the plants from a border that had been planted many years back by Pauline Hitchman, was revealed.

Although there is still some tidying up to be done it should be easier to keep on top of the work in future.

Sewage Issues

The River Leam Problem

SEVERN TRENT

As you will know from Miranda's communications, if not your own eyes, all is not well with the River Leam (see Newsletter front cover).

The issue of it being choked by vegetation is not the main part of this problem; that is a result of Environment Agency policy not to scour the rivers to ease the flow of water in flooding situations.

Concerns are regarding the operations of Severn Trent and the sewage treatment plant at Frankton in particular. Water quality and water levels have declined. Crisis pumping of raw sewage into the river seems to have increased. Another possible contributory factor is water extraction further upstream that may explain the lower water levels

noted in the river at Marton (not the responsibility of Severn Trent).

Severn Trent claims that run off from farm land is the main problem for the decline in water quality, despite statistics suggesting otherwise for the Leam. But, despite contacts for more information Severn Trent have not been very forthcoming.

Some villagers who had complained were told about a Severn Trent organized drop-in session at Wellesbourne Village Hall on Thursday 21 August . This was all they could offer despite being offered free use of Marton Village Hall for a public meeting.

Some concerned campaigners from the village trekked down to Wellesbourne anyway to see if there would be some straight answers. As it was suspected the presentations covered across a large part of Warwickshire as well as the work of Severn Trent in general, though, few words were devoted to developments at the Frankton works.

Fortunately the questions that followed offered a little more insight, but not much.

The parish council have managed to get a promise from Oliver Hills, who is delightfully titled 'Waster Network Customer Lead' at Severn Trent to come and speak at Marton about the Leam and what has been going on at the Frankton sewage treatment works.

Tour of Britain Cycle Race

Be prepared for Marton's few minutes of national sporting fame sometime in the middle of the day on Friday 5 September. The Lloyds Tour of Britain cycle race will be travelling through Warwickshire, starting at Atherstone and ending up at Burton Dassett. It will be heading along the Birdingbury Road and then turning right towards Princethorpe along the main road.



This will mean the Birdingbury Road and the A423 will be closed for a short time while the cyclists come through the village. This will only

Marton Museum's Final Fling of the Year

It has been an exceptionally busy summer at the museum with ten visits of groups who also enjoyed refreshments in the pavilion (special thanks to the bakers of our glorious homemade cakes). Also visitor numbers are up on our Sunday afternoon open sessions, thanks to improved publicity.

We have also resolved the problem of the Leamington Hastings Turret Clock. This seventeenth century clock mechanism has been in the





museum since it was donated by Leamington Hastings Church in the early 1970s. It has been noted as of some significance by national authorities but was not in working order or shown off to its best in the museum, and Leamington Hastings Church did not want it back. It is now in the care of the Turret Clock Group part of the Antiquarian Horological Society who will restore it to its full glory.



Preparations are now in hand for our biggest occasion of the year when we take part in the Heritage Open Weekend on 13 and 14 September from 10.00-5.00pm (see inside back cover). Tea and cakes will be available through that time in the Pavilion. As in previous years there will be speciality stalls demonstrating all sorts of museum related activities.

The Museum will be open until the end of September but be wary of Pavilion work going on in the latter part of the month.

They have a questionnaire that covers all things to do with fires, such as exit routes from your house and smoke alarms, but they also cover social care items such as mobility or cost of living issues and can provide advice and access to support if needed. They will also provide smoke alarms for free and devices that will vibrate under your pillow if you cannot hear a smoke alarm when asleep. Whilst most things were ok for us, they did identify that the one carbon monoxide meter was too far from the fire and the other was now out of date! It is an hour well spent to get peace of mind that you have everything in place and, since they are changing to a retained station at Southam, they have more time available for these visits. 

Grasshoppers

"Ah! Grasshopper" (remember Master Po, the blind monk in the 1970 series of Kung Fu?)

Anyway, during the last few weeks and more recently as I cleared some of my wilding (and so letting next years seeds fall to the ground), I saw many, many grasshoppers and some bush crickets which got me thinking now that I've cleared the wilding, where do they go?

Effectively, what is the life cycle of these creatures? By the way, the wilding has been an important part of their one year only, happy lives.

Eggs- The male has already "transferred" sperm to the female and in the late summer and early autumn as she lays her eggs in soil (have I dealt with the wilding too early?), each egg is internally fertilised before it enters the



soil. The eggs stay in the soil over winter and in the spring, as it warms up, little nymphs hatch out.

Nymphs- looking like little grasshoppers go through 5 or 6 moults before reaching adulthood (including the necessary reproduction bits and pieces) They eat grasses and plants and are an important part of the ecosystem system

Adults- At this stage they have fully developed wings and can fly, though only over a short distance. They live through the summer, mate and lays eggs before dying as autumn turns to winter.

So there we have it, I'm much wiser for this article and now know that I've probably dealt with the wilding too early, sadly!

Thanks to the many fundraising efforts made over the years for cancer charities the risk of developing cancer no longer holds as great a fear as it once did.


Developments in medical research borders on the miraculous.

Revd Richard's Final Message:

Dear Friends,

Our experiences of life can be so varied. Where we are born, the circumstances of our lives and the so called "changes and chances"

of life seem to determine so much of how our lives turn out, and our experiences in the journey from birth to journey's end. A friend of mine, wrote this reflection recently:

TWO JOURNEYS

- I crossed the channel this week
- It cost me £125
- I was on a luxury boat
- I was warm and dry
- It could carry thousands
- I had it almost to myself
- I had a bowl of soup and a glass of wine in the cafe
- I read my book
- There were life rafts, emergency procedures and a trained and qualified crew
- It was beautifully quiet
- I arrived safely
- I disembarked
- I went on my way to sleep in a comfortable bed
- And all because I happened to be born in The United Kingdom
- Is my life an accident of geography? Compare this with the experience of those of whom we hear a lot in the media these days:
- I crossed the channel this week
- It cost me £4,500

- I was crammed in an inflatable dinghy
- I was cold and wet
- It was meant for 8 people
- There was hardly room to sit down
- I was hungry and thirsty
- I gripped the sides for dear life
- I wore a broken life jacket
- A large wave tipped the boat over
- All I could hear were frantic screams
- The boat was on top of me pressing me down
- I couldn't swim
- I was freezing
- I couldn't breathe
- I didn't make it
- And all because I happened to be born in Iran
- My life ended because of an accident of geography.

When I read this reflection, I realised which of the two travellers I have been fortunate to have been:

The first one, who, thanks to my "accident" of birth have had so many life advantages compared to others who have been born into poverty and hardship. It's a challenge to me to turn my advantages to advantage others. To share what I have to help the less privileged. God will call us to account for how we have or have not done this.

There are remarkable stories of people born into poverty "making good." They have not allowed their circumstances to cause them to despair. Maybe they have had "lucky breaks" as we might call them. But some of them have simply made the most of their opportunities and have enjoyed the benefit of vision and hard work. Others have come to tragic ends, seeking a life in another country where they hope that life will be better. How the international community needs to work together to help the helpless.

In contrast, some people live "If only" lives. They are convinced that their lives would be better had certain things happened or not happened to them. They live with and are tormented by regrets. Some circumstances in life are unavoidable while others can either be avoided or learned from, even benefitted from. Some of these people are guite well off and advantaged in life. But they just can't see it. They cannot see how God has helped and provided for them and even how privileged they are. They regret what they do not have rather than being grateful for what they do have. An attitude of gratitude towards God for His daily mercies can transform us from whingers to people of thanksgiving and praise.

A wise man once told me of the Triple AAAs of life that he followed. And he wasn't talking about batteries! What he meant was that whatever our circumstances in life, approach the difficult ones with the "AAA" mentality and approach. To be specific:

A – Accept. Accept that some of life's circumstances are the way that they are. If you can't change them or get out of negative or difficult circumstances, then accept that fact and learn to live with it. Our difficulties and challenges in life, once accepted, can teach us things which help us to empathise with others and help them. We can be more wise, understanding, and compassionate.

A - Adapt. Having accepted that some of life's

circumstances and events are as they are, then adapt to them positively. As someone once said: "If life gives you lemons, make lemonade!" Our positive response to difficulties helps give hope to others.

A – Adorn. Having accepted and adapted, how can we positively thrive in our circumstances and make the most of them. How can we glorify God in our circumstances? How can we be "salt and light" as Jesus said a Christian should be?

Let's ask God to give us grace to be triple A Christians. Ones which are more enduring than even the best of the Duracell batteries! This will be my last article for the Marton Magazine as Jacqui and I retire and move on this month. Thank you for the friendship and kindness we have enjoyed in the Village. My final sermon series in the Benefice is based on readings from the Book of Joshua in the Bible. The last of which focusses on Joshua's concluding remarks to the people of God, including: "Choose this day whom you will serve.... As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Jesus is The Way, The Truth, and the Life. Whatever "shore" life may have washed us up on, if we have chosen His way then we can not only survive, but also eternally thrive.
