River Leam, Severn Trent and Pollution

Early on Tuesday 18 November the Severn Trent Rangers paid a visit to Marton. This was to follow up on concerns by various villagers regarding the state of the River Leam (and promised after the village hall meeting with Severn Trent in October).



The Rangers are just the sort of practical contact that could be a lot of use in building accurate data on the River Leam.

The Rangers are dedicated to protecting local rivers and helping them to thrive. Amongst their day-to-day tasks include monitoring and sampling activities that should help us to better understand the quality of the Leam. It's only a shame that our Severn Trent contacts had not pushed them in our direction earlier. (continued on page 4)

Street Sweeping

Rugby Borough Council is still committed to sweeping the streets. This used to be once a month, though, personnel shortages that meant that what were once occasional missed visits are now happening more often. MPC do ask to be notified in advance so they can try to inform the village to keep the streets clear, but RBC are tending to work as and when!

Saving Slippy Marton

We can also help without RBC. The autumn leaves in the village turn into slush that can prove to be a slippery hazard as winter progresses. Where possible, try to give the paths outside your house a good clean and help prevent accidents.

Marton Playing Fields Pavilion Work

The long awaited second stage of the Pavilion refurbishment will be starting around the time you will be receiving this Newsletter.

Please keep away from the area between the pavilion and the museum for the next few weeks.

By the end of the work, few of the changes will be obvious as they will have been internal, such as the new kitchen. But some on the field side should be quite a revelation.

The Black Horse

Marton Parish Council has been approached by villagers concerned about the future of the pub and its state of repair. The clerk has managed to contact the owners. Unfortunately as the commercial lease is still in place they are unable to take possession of the building until that is resolved. The future of the building will be decided once that is achieved.

It now looks as if the persistence by some of our fellow villagers has born fruit



The Rangers proved to be very helpful and resourceful, offering a programme of sampling that will provide the sort of evidential data that has been requested by some Marton residents for a long time as previous concerns about foul smells, dirty water and choked vegetation can be dismissed by authorities as subjective opinion or blamed on agricultural run-off. The programme The Rangers are putting in place should authoritatively address some of these issues.

They will be taking monthly samples for the next year at three locations in the village:

- 1. A423 road bridge over the Leam.
- 2. The bridge over the Itchen to Eathorpe.
- 3. The Birdingbury Road ford.

The Rangers will test for:

Ammonia which is a strong indicator of

sewage or animal waste.

Nitrates & Phosphates which are indications of fertiliser run-off and sewage effluent. High levels can lead to plant an algal growth and depletion of oxygen leading to death of aquatic animals.

LDO sensors measure the amount of dissolved oxygen indicating the health of the water for aquatic life.

Electrical Conductivity which can indicate the water's ability to conduct an electrical current which can vary according to the amount of certain chemicals such as road salt run-off or household chemicals discharged by

sewage treatment works.

In November they took samples from the river bridge and carried out an analysis there and then. The results, this time, were



demonstrably within 'normal tolerances'. Further information about what this means will be explained in a future article.

Marton Art & Craft Workshop

The group met in the village hall for the 2025 Christmas session. It was very well attended



by members bringing a variety of painting and craft techniques and it was a good excuse to share an excellent lunch

and mulled wine. Everyone was so helpful in setting up the hall and all were eager to learn and share expertise.

There were two demonstrations. Joan gave a repeat textured acrylic for those who had missed it the first-time round and then, the star of the show, was Clare's Cyanotyping, a new technique for everyone present.



This photochemical process was invented in late Victorian times and has become popular very recently with kits available online. Clare encouraged everyone to use her materials, this included a state-of-the-art light box operated by Robert. It was a cardboard box

and ultraviolet lamp, daylight would have worked but it would have taken much longer at this time of the year. Essentially the surface, paper or material is painted with potassium ferrocyanide and any flat object which blocks the light is laid on it and pressed between a backing plate and transparent



cover this is exposed to the light and the result is a blue and white picture.

Graham Robson

Graham Robson Marton Farmer (1931-2025)



The celebration of Graham Robson's life was held on 14 November at Oakley Wood crematorium and Hill Top Farm. As brother Gordon said in his well-crafted eulogy, Graham must have organised the stormy day as after all farming was all about coping with extremes of weather. The mourners represented the many aspects of Graham's life

but did not wear wellingtons!

Graham was about two when his parents

took on the tenancy at Hockley Farm, Eathorpe. From an early age he would have been expected to involve himself in the farming way of life, as were his sister Beryl and brother Gordon.



They were all privately educated, Graham's prep school was in Leamington. He travelled there by train from Marton station and was never late or missed a day. He gained a place at Bloxham School, his parents bought him a Peter Scott wildlife picture as a reward and a

reflection on his natural history interests which were growing at that time.

As he grew up, he became a very active



member of local Young Farmers Associations and learned a lot about judging livestock, running organisations and public speaking, all of which stood him in good stead in his professional life, but equally important he met and married a fellow member, Jean. Living at Hockley farm they went on to have three daughters and a son and ten grandchildren and a great grandson.

Graham became well known as a judge and breeder of shorthorn cattle and later of Lleyn



sheep. One accolade was judging these sheep at the Royal Welsh show. Another one was being invited to participate in a study visit to Australia investigating Shorthorn cattle. There was also the time when he had to give an address whilst sitting on the same table as Queen Elizabeth II.

The village knew Graham as a parish councillor and he was the chairman for several years. He supported George Tims in

setting up the museum and was one of the original trustees, a position he maintained for many years supporting the village ownership. Many items in the museum originated at Hockley Farm as their use was superseded by modern technology. As a tribute to Graham's work in the village a small exhibition will be set up in the museum and showing during 2026. His book 90 Years on a Farm, will be on sale.

Sometime after Mr Robson seniors' retirement the farm was divided between Graham and Gordon. When Graham retired, he and Jean converted Tythe Barn at the end of Field Farm Lane, and retained some thirty acres. Graham developed a private nature reserve near the railway track. This was made up of a wooded area and small lake with island, on which Jean's ashes were

placed. He did a lot of planting; the whole area rapidly became colonised. The dragonflies, some of the species uncommon, all were an absolute joy. Graham and helpers entertained local natural history groups to identify species and share the quiet ecosystem.

He developed a particular interest in Barn Owls, setting up nesting boxes and encouraging their breeding. Moth trapping was another interest and one he shared with Biddy and Roy Allen,



Roy was Graham's farm manager for many years. Graham compiled a species list of the wildlife in the Marton Parish; he became an expert photographer and

video maker. He was much in demand as a speaker and film presenter to local organisations. Any money he earned from the sale of his DVDs and talks he sent to



Myton Hospice, the grand total was £17,000.

He was an active committee member of Rugby Natural History Society, housed in Rugby School until the society's demise, and a member of

Warwickshire Wildlife Trust. Recently he was still involved in the organisation of Kenilworth Show, having been involved in the running of the Royal Show up to its demise.

Graham it was a life well lived, the still photos and DVDs of Marton wildlife are now part of the Museum's collection, thankyou.

In fact so much material has been discovered that more presentations will be made in future years dealing with prominent artists in other media.

This time attention was focussed on those who had made a living from the medium of paint .



This included various past inhabitants of The Croft, 23 North Street (Andrew Restall

Developments

Marton Museum Renovations

Despite the onset of winter chill in the museum, a lot has been happening. Our wonderful master of all trades, Kevin, has been busy sorting



out the accumulation of work identified over the summer. Forty years since George Tims created his kitchen display it has been removed and the space renovated (the ceiling will no longer threaten to fall in!).





A lick of paint to all surfaces and installation of period reproduction shelving has created an excellent setting for the new display (see above), carefully curated by some of the museum volunteers.

It has proven to be a significant improvement to the presentation of this section of the museum. It only needs the planned installation of a new lighting scheme to set the display off to best effect.

Some other important work has also been completed; the thorough cleaning of the roof space, various painting work and installation of shelving in a reorganised dairy section.

Marton Museum Clothing Evaluation

A important but unheralded part of George's original collection was the accumulation of items of clothing from

past generations.

There is no space to put these on display and so they are carefully packaged away in the Museum store in special storage boxes wrapped in conservation tissue.

When the volunteers first took over the museum more than fifteen years ago the items of clothing were all identified and assessed by a specialist materials conservation expert from Worcestershire Museum Service.

Just this week the whole collection (29 boxes) was transferred for the day to the Village Hall to be laid out and checked for any damage, repacked in clean tissue and re-categorised to make it easier to extract them for exhibitions when the opportunity arises. For many of the volunteers who have joined since the early days it was something of a revelation, although dominated by undergarments there was plenty of outerwear and various accessories.

A few stand-out gems included an eighteenth century royal blue silk jacket and a 1908 tablecloth with the hand embroidered signatures of many local villagers.



2. APOLOGIES

Cllr Dale Keeling, PCSO David Banks

3. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 9 September signed by Cllr Rob Lummis.

4. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

4.1 Primary school bus stop has been moved to the main road with only a couple of days' notice, 'in response to public requests'. Even if not crossing the main road, it is dangerous for young children and the pavement is narrow.

Cllr Chambers to follow up with WCC to see if the decision can be reversed.

- 4.2 Continuing problem in Church Street with large vehicles going down the narrow street, particularly with an artic causing damage recently. If restrict parking so traffic can go through, will cause problems elsewhere in the village. Sat navs. currently direct down Church Street rather than Shepherd Street; need mechanism to direct lorries, maybe through weight limit on access. Cllr Fry to Follow up with Highways and Cllr Keeling.
- 4.3 Streetlight next to church raised. See section 9.6.

5. COUNCILLORS DECLARATION OF INTEREST

None

6. POLICE ISSUES

6.1 Further Community Speedwatch sessions planned for December and January.

7. PLANNING MATTERS

- 7.1 Hall Farm; update from Rugby Planning indicated a procedural matter which will mean there is unlikely to be any movement for a couple of months.
- 7.2 Penpol; no concerns raised in relation to the new application. Welcome Pack to be delivered.

8. VILLAGE ISSUES

8.1 The purpose of the Emergency Plan leaflet was questioned by ClIr Chambers.

Discussion outside the meeting.

- 8.2 Village Gateway funding details provided by Cllr Keeling needs match funding from MPC, which is currently not an option.
- 8.3 No further update on pavement to Long Itchington.
- 8.4 Update on Severn Trent meeting at Village Hall. It is a step in the right direction, but disappointing follow up after the meeting; not yet received water testing results. Cllr Fry to follow up if not forthcoming. Severn Trent is managing the community testing scheme. Birmingham University research is separate, but not heard back from them yet.

Cllr Heath to contact CPRE to ask if they can provide any help.

- 8.5 Use of residential property followed up on resident's concerns. Remove from agenda.
- 8.6 Parking issues and school bus stop covered in Public Participation section.
- 8.7 Black Horse owners identified and contacted re the future of the building. As the commercial lease is still in place they are unable to take possession of the building until that is resolved. The future of the building will be decided once that is achieved.
- 8.8 Assertion 10 and required changes to website and email addresses covered. The existing arrangements will not be compliant in April '26, resulting in changes and extra costs. Parish Council needs to own their own domain, rather than share with the village,

Council

and all councillors need separate (non-personal) email addresses, although there is currently not an obligation to use gov.uk. Options looked at so far are likely to be in excess of £200pa, compared to our current cost of £47pa. Further investigation to be made with current suppliers as to how we could cost effectively amend our existing arrangement, in order to be compliant, rather than start again.

9. **VILLAGE UPDATES AND MAINTENANCE**

- 9.1 Community Network continues to provide support.
- 9.2 Marton Playing Field Association now has a budget of £20k to cover the next stage of development. More will be needed to finish the outside. Internal designs currently being finalised, hopefully to start in December/January. Marton Art to be asked if will put art on the walls, old photos of Marton Sports Day also

suggested. Flat maypole base proposed between Museum and Pavilion; agreed by Councillors. Final checks regarding space required to be done.

- 9.3 Roads and Footpaths. Pot holes at end of High Street still outstanding. Issues with gutters and drains; main road drain full of vegetation, debris from cleared drain left in gutter, report of pooling water still an issue on Birdingbury Road. Cllr Fry to follow up.
- 9.4 Grass and Hedges. Grass cutting contract continues until March '26 (October '24 cut was a separate, one-off). Longer contract options to be priced as part of budget setting.
- 9.5 MPEG. New hedge laid to far side of playing field.
 Rubbish cleared and will be mulched and returned for use on new plants. Volunteers will be needed after Xmas for planting. A lot of funding for

the materials used was provided, plus the experts and trainers and the Highways team awayday staff. Letter of thanks from Cllr Heath to be sent from Clerk email.

- 9.6 Quote for new streetlamp on main road finally provided. New lamp plus replacement of Church Street unit totals over £5000 including vat. Cllr Chambers to investigate possible grants. Match funding for the Church Street unit may be an option in the meantime.
- 9.7 Chippings have been laid in the bus shelter area which will keep it tidy for the time being.
