Marton Wildflowers

Marton Wildflower Success

Like a fine wine, wildflower meadows improve with age. It takes patience to wait for the benefits to accrue, but at long last, the evidence of improvement is becoming increasingly obvious.



In previous reports, it has been stressed how important it is that soil fertility is gradually reduced to provide the best conditions for wildflowers. This entails the

time-consuming task of collecting and removing grass cuttings after mowing, rather than leaving them to decompose and return nutrients to the soil.

Over time, this process helps reduce the vigour of coarse grasses and creates space for a wider variety of flowers to thrive.

Another important ingredient in the success of our meadows is Yellow Rattle. This fascinating native plant is partially parasitic on grass roots, taking some of its nutrients from neighbouring grasses and helping to reduce their dominance. It was one of the species included when the meadow areas were first established, and this year we have seen a significant increase in its abundance. In some areas this has already led to a noticeable thinning of the grass sward, allowing other wildflowers more room to flourish.

Alongside this, we are beginning to see an increase in some of the finer meadow

grasses, including Crested Dog's-tail, a characteristic species of traditional wildflower meadows. Unlike the more vigorous grasses often found in improved grassland, Crested Dog's-tail provides structure and habitat without overwhelming the flowers and is a welcome sign that the meadow is continuing to develop in the right direction.

Flowering occurs in waves throughout the season, with different species taking their turn in the spotlight. Earlier in the spring we enjoyed an excellent display of Cowslips, while Bird's-foot Trefoil is currently adding vibrant splashes of yellow and orange across many of the meadow areas. Keep an eye out over the coming weeks for Common Knapweed, with its rich purple flowers, together with a variety of vetches, selfheal and other meadow species. Even the grasses tell a story, with the distinctive seed heads of Crested Dog's-tail becoming increasingly noticeable as the meadow matures.

The meadows are not just about flowers. They support a huge range of insects including bees, butterflies, hoverflies and beetles, which in turn provide food for birds, amphibians and small mammals. Every year the

meadows become a little more established and supports a little more wildlife. During management work it is not uncommon to see frogs, toads and small mammals making use of the cover provided by the taller vegetation.

As the meadow matures, management is also evolving. While most of the area continues to thrive under the existing regime, some small patches are beginning to be managed differently where certain grasses have become locally dominant. This targeted approach helps maintain diversity across the site while allowing the meadow to develop naturally. By focusing management on specific areas, we can encourage the continued spread of wildflowers and maintain a rich variety of habitats across the meadow.

Visitors can enjoy a closer look at the wildflowers and

wildlife from the mown access routes and picnic area within the large meadow behind the museum. These provide opportunities to experience the meadow at close quarters while helping to protect the wider habitat.

Thank you to everyone who has supported the project over the years. What began as a long-term investment in nature is now maturing into a colourful and increasingly diverse community asset. As the meadow continues to develop, we can look forward to increasing diversity, more wildlife, and a rich mosaic of flowers and grasses that changes from year to year and season to season.

Help Needed in July/August

The next work is to cut down the



wildflowers. This was done in August previously, but given the recent weather, it may be in July this year. As ever, it will be important to collect the cuttings after a few days,

allowing the seeds to separate. If this is not done, the composted cuttings will return fertility to the soil, and we will take a few steps backwards. Low fertility = more wildflower variety.

Walking in the Countryside, Footpaths, Dogs and Landowners



For those who live, work and enjoy leisure in the countryside around Marton, concerns from walkers and landowners are pleasingly rare. When they do

crop up, it is worth bearing the respective concerns in mind.

The official government Country Code boils down to a few basic points:

- *be considerate to those living in, working in and enjoying the countryside*
- *leave gates and property as you find them*
- *give wild animals, livestock and horses plenty of space. Their behaviour can be unpredictable, especially when they are with their young, and you could get hurt.*

This latter point can be an issue for dog walkers who are requested to:

- *keep your dog under effective control to make sure it stays away from wildlife, livestock, horses and other people unless invited. You should:*

Countryside Code

- *always keep your dog on a lead or in sight*
- *be confident your dog will return on command*
- *make sure your dog does not stray from the path or area where you have the right of access.*

Although it is not required to keep dogs on a lead, except where livestock are in a field, ask yourself how certain it is that they are not disturbing ground-nesting birds?

Landowners' legal responsibility is to ensure footpaths are kept clear. The Farming Advice Service explains that:

- *cross-field paths need to be clear even within a fortnight after ploughing.*
- *Also, before a crop grows to 15cm, the crop should be removed from the path.*
- *Clear access should be maintained throughout the growing season.*

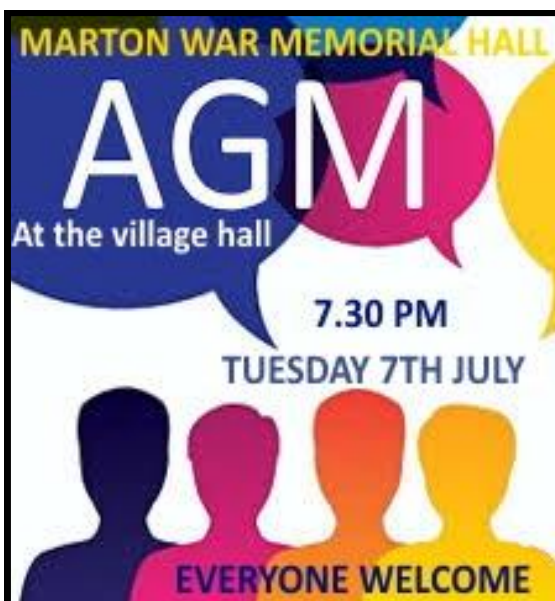

Ann's snippets

A Fanatic in Marton Leamington Spa Courier 20 July 1861

"The quiet little village of Marton still continues to be the scene of considerable excitement and disturbance caused by the intrusion of a travelling preacher, who speaks his pernicious doctrine much to the annoyance of the inhabitants. On Friday week he was honourably received by "A tin kettle" band, and accompanied to the boundary of the Parish, and it is hoped that he will have the good sense never to enter the village again".

NB A 'tin kettle band' was the description given to a group of people banging with sticks and spoons on a kettle, saucepans, buckets or any other noise making implements to drive unwanted visitors away from a place.

Hello Martonians, allow me to present the July update from Marton Garage. I have been graciously complimented on my composition of these newsletters. Crafting them is a genuine enjoyment of mine; it allows my creative mind to flow.

In recent weeks, we have had the pleasure of MoT-ing a Lancia Delta and an incredibly rare Peugeot 205 T16, courtesy of our friends at

Tolman Motorsport. Seeing

automotive icons like that in the garage makes the hard work worthwhile!

I am focused on strengthening the garage processes & streamlining operations. As we see an influx of workload, my admin time has increased significantly. 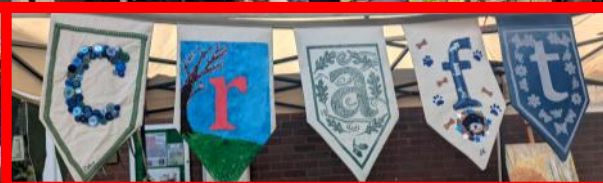
